Alvin William Cook, 78, of Woodstock, passed away Monday, October 1, 2012 at his home. The funeral will be held Friday, October 5, 2012 at 11:00 a.m. at St. Luke Brethren Church. Reverends Freddie Helsley and Howard Lutz will officiate. Burial with military honors by Edinburg VFW #2447 and Woodstock American Legion Post #199 will follow in the church cemetery. Mr. Cook was born July 11, 1934 in St. Luke, son of the late Carl and Thelma George Cook. He was a 1952 graduate of Woodstock High School and an Army veteran of the Korean War. He was formerly employed at Safeway for 39 years and C.E. Thompson for 11 years. “ 10-3-2012 Alvin's accidental death is totally tragic, and for me, almost unbelievable. It is most deeply saddening to me- a huge loss. Alvin Cook was one of my very BEST FRIENDS IN MY WHOLE LIFE. Alvin and I started to school together at St. Luke school and we attended school together all the way through high school. Alvin and I used to play cowboys in grade school. We brought our leather holsters and plastic 6 shooters to school and played at recess and lunch time. Alvin and I rode our bikes to school a lot. Mr. Fravel, the teacher, let me ride with Alvin back to Alvin's farm one day to get something. Alvin and I always volunteered to put up and take down the American flag at school.-it took the two of us to fold it. After the fourth grade we played baseball at recess and lunch time whenever the weather was good enough. Alvin always beat me eating lunch and made it to the play yard first. Sometimes we were lucky enough to have a nickel or dime and would go to the William Foltz store across from the school and get a candy bar, soda pop, or a cream sickle or chock cow ice cream. Alvin used to drive his father's dump truck to high school on some occasions which was something I couldn't do was drive a vehicle at the time. In high school Alvin was a member of the Future Farmers of America. Alvin worked for Safeway grocery stores in Fairfax and Falls Church , VA for a long number of years, and later on he transferred to the new Safeway store in Woodstock. Alvin bought the Carl Keller farm on Wisman Road off of Back Road about a mile and a half from my homeplace on Back Road. Alvin made a lot of improvements to the house. He had a natural flowing spring with great water. Alvin raised top (shoats) pigs on his farm. There was one occasion he borrowed my father's male hg for breeding purposes. The last time I saw Alvin was at the 55th Class reunion in Edinburg. Alvin drew out of the hat a winning ticket and was crowned King of the senior prom enactment . Alvin was sort of bashful as he was most of the time when something similar took place. Alvin was a very honest, decent, respectable, likeable, and a very pleasant person. Everyone I ever knew liked Alvin and respected him very highly. Alvin will most certainly be missed. This accident is a case of "how uncertain life can be". Alvin attended
