Upon his retirement, he accepted a job with the Navy Department working with computers and won numerous awards for his money saving ideas being able to put this into programs saving the Department millions of dollars. He and his wife moved to the Shenandoah Valley from Falls Church, Virginia upon his retirement from the Federal Government living first in Mt. Jackson then moving to Woodstock. Survivors include his loving wife of 55 years, Mary (Bowers) and his two sons, Robert of Ashville, North Carolina and Donald of Knoxville, Tennessee., daughters-in-law Tommi and Stephanie and grandchildren Bill with U.S. Air Force, Robin, and Bethany, as well as one special niece, Pam Hanasosky of Sterling.
